The audience was also treated to choreographed performances by Amari to Beyoncé's "Brown Skinned Girl," numerous performances by Morningside High School's Step Team, the Omega Gents and renditions of "I Wonder as I Wander," "Rise up Sheppard & Follow," Swing Low Sweet Chariot," "When the Saints Come Marching In," & "Kumbaya" performed by the Inglewood High School violin orchestra.

Inglewood Mayor James T. Butts, Jr. welcomed everyone and thanked the SBWIB for partnering with Inglewood to create the teen center that not only provides a safe alternative for youth during after school hours but also gives them resources to prepare themselves to achieve higher education and career pathway training opportunities.
